


When the Winterville Cultural Center Gallery opened last summer, we decided to be more sustainable, but renting plates and glasses instead of disposables was pricey. So, we asked WAC members to donate wine glasses and dessert plates from local thrift stores, and only rented to supplement our tiny collection. Then we received a very generous offer. WAC member Eden DeGeorge mentioned our needs to her husband Paul, who works in the food and beverage business. They not only donated plates and glasses from their business but also offered us a deep discount on the crates to store them all.

By April, we no longer needed to rent glasses or dishes, but we realized that the Winterville Center's residential dishwashers could not quickly clean the volume of dishes used during a reception. A commercial-grade dishwasher was needed to handle the demand. City Council agreed that a commercial dishwasher would benefit the Winterville Cultural Center as a whole, and WAC agreed to pay one-third of the cost. But once again, WAC received an anonymous and generous monetary donation to help with WAC's portion of the cost and installation.


Now installed, the commercial dishwasher has been used at our opening art reception this past August! And WOW, what a difference it has made in the time it takes to perform cleanup after events! 
- WAC hosts Kid Art at the Marigold Market the 1st Saturday of every month (during market season).

Brilliant performances by a cast of mostly Winterville actors were the highlight of the show. Hannah Orsag played the frazzled Eleanor Vance, who, during her week at



the mansion, descends into madness. Her performance was bolstered by Frank Wynne, who played the psychic researcher, Dr. Montague; Megan Sullivan as the psychicempath Theodora; Matthew Orsag as Luke Sanderson, heir to the mansion; Jessica Parker portraying Mrs. Montague, the dauntless medium; James Cook as the meek and nervous Arthur Parker, and Catherine Littlepage as the unnerving housekeeper, Mrs. Dudley.

Aside from an array of local acting talent, the production brought out many other talents. Frank Wynne dressed the set from his Lexington (soon-to-be) event venue, James West lit the set with a panoply of throbbing color changes, and Tania Marler sent wind and storm through the auditorium while stage crew, Jamie Mendenhall-Turner and David Matthews-Morgan, made Hill House come alive. The auditorium lobby was transformed for the season of goblins and ghosts and featured mimes Millie Parker and Paige Dixon as live mannequins before the show and during intermission.

Director Kelly Flanders and Assistant Director Anita Turlington are grateful for the Winterville talent and enthusiastic Winterville audience that allows such explosive and vibrant performances to come alive in the Marigold Auditorium.

Eat Well, Live Well: Marigold Collective **Supports Community-Focused Nutrition Outreach**

This summer brought an abundance of fresh, local produce to the Marigold Market-but behind the scenes, the Marigold Collective has been hard at work ensuring that everyone in the community can share in that bounty.

"Healthy, beautiful meals are possible on a budget." That's the takeaway from a participant in Get Fresh, one of education programs. Developed and led by Athens Regional, Get Fresh teaches





chronic disease prevention through handson wellness training. Held bi-weekly at the Collective's cornerstone nutrition the Winterville Depot, the program covers topics such as strategic grocery shopping, UGA Family and Consumer Science Agent food preparation, and food preservation. Brad Averill and supported by Piedmont Participants are encouraged to eat locally and seasonally to boost nutrition—and after each session, they receive a bundle of locally grown fruits and vegetables to take home and prepare for their families. As one participant shared, "I'm learning how to make the most of what's available."

> Beyond Get Fresh, the Marigold Collective is also partnering with local farmers to promote "food as medicine" through a Prescription Produce Program. Funded by Wholesome Wave Georgia and facilitated by St. Mary's Hospital, this initiative uses the CDC's Diabetes Prevention Program curriculum. It currently supports two active cohorts, with registration now open for three additional groups launching this fall.

> This year-long program begins with weekly classes, each accompanied by a prescription bag of nutrient-dense produce to help participants make lasting, measurable dietary changes.

chronic disease, build strong communities, and support local economies. That belief drives the Marigold Collective's work.

Earlier this summer, the Collective was awarded an AgGeorgia Credit Union Farmers Market marketing grant, which will fund the reconstruction of three garden beds in the Winterville Community Garden. These beds, planted with seeds donated by the Collective, will be dedicated to growing produce for community members in need.



Programs like these thrive thanks to community support. When you shop at the Marigold Farmers Market, you're not just buying food-you're supporting local farmers and small businesses that make these initiatives possible.

Our newest project, The Firefly Farmstop, is a step toward long-term sustainability. Revenue from the storefront will directly support our programs, helping us move closer to becoming a fully communityfunded nonprofit.

HISTORY & MUSEUMS

Tf there's one sentence I've heard most over the years, it has been "you should do ▲ a ghost tour!" Even though paranormal programs are more entertainment than history, we can still get into the spooky spirit of the season anyway! Fortunately, our little city has the perfect resource for this.

The Winterville Cemetery, located on Parkview Road just past Pittard Park, is the final resting place for hundreds of Winterville's former citizens. Walking past immediately familiar. Whether it's Diedrich Heinrich "Henry" Winter (1817-1891) who was the first of that family to settle here, John T. Pittard (1856-1965) whose general store once stood near the entrance to our present-day park, or William M. Coile (1852-1942) who founded both our Baptist Church



and the Winterville School, the cemetery hosts a roster of famous Wintervillians.

There are also names here that you probably won't immediately recognize. There's Dr. Thomas Anthony (1810-1882), our town's first physician; Henry "Hal" Johnson (1850-1899), an architect who designed some of Winterville's most recognizable homes; Jennie Murrell (1875-1892), a young woman beloved by our town but struck down before even reaching adulthood.



October 18 is a cemetery clean-up event from 9:00 am to noon. We will provide professional preservation supplies and training to ensure that the stones and markers that dot the landscape are well protected and readable for years to come.

> Our program on **November 1** is of a different sort. In partnership with the Winterville Players, we are proud to present a cemetery walk that evening, where you can "meet" some of the denizens who once walked our streets. This tour involves moderate walking and lasts approximately 40 minutes, then repeats at 5:30, 6:00, and 6:30 pm. Spots are limited to 20 people per tour, though, so register early!

ELECTION UPDATE

city Council Seats – There will be 2 City Council seats up for election this November. A candidate forum will be hosted by the Winterville Civitan Club and held in the Pittard Park Pavilion on **Tuesday, October 14th**, following the regular meeting of City Council. See this Gazette for more information and come hear from the candidates.

ALCOHOL BY THE DRINK

iquor by the drink will be on the November Ballot. If passed, this would allow for local establishments and restaurants to serve distilled spirits by the drink Monday through Sunday. The city has followed a very careful timeline to offer the citizens opportunities to purchase beer, wine, and now distilled spirits, encouraging citizen input throughout. Your vote will also determine this outcome.

SUNDAY SALES

Package Sales Sales on Sunday will also be on the November Ballot. Please note that this does not mean package stores will be allowed. Package Stores are not an allowable use under our City code, so you will not see a liquor store in the City of Winterville. This would simply allow packaged beer and wine to be sold on Sunday in convenience stores or grocery stores (e.g., the Golden Pantry or Dollar General).

WINTERVILLE'S 2026 BUDGET

a draft 2026 balanced budget to share with the public. The finance committee and City Council have worked diligently to balance a budget that is becoming increasingly difficult to balance. STORMWATER PROJECT ON MAIN STREET

Stormwater Project on Main Street: The Stormwater Project on Main Street, funded by the 2023 ACC TSPLOST, is tentatively scheduled to begin in early 2026 with a targeted completion date of December 2026. This project will provide larger piping under Main Street and improved facilities leading to outfalls, so stormwater will be removed quickly and more efficiently from Main Street.

CURVE FROM ATHENS RD TO SMITHONIA

A Engineering has been surveying the dangerous curve between Winter Street and Church Street. We should have a design solution for that area very soon so that we can determine the best way to protect pedestrians, homes, and drivers along that stretch. This is part of our ongoing effort to calm traffic throughout the city.

What's That Flag All About?

Leadership, Spirit, & Community at Winterville Elementary School

If you've driven past Winterville Elementary lately, you may have noticed a brightly colored flag waving proudly outside the school. That flag isn't just decoration—it's a symbol of leadership, teamwork, and the spirit of our students.

Winterville Elementary is a **Leader in Me** school, a Franklin Covey program inspired by Stephen Covey's "7 Habits of Highly Effective People." Through this approach, students learn how to set goals, take responsibility, show initiative, and work together—skills that will benefit them for a lifetime. To bring these habits to life, our school is structured into four colonies that form one hive.

Each colony represents a powerful leadership quality and is symbolized by its own color:

- Purple Colony of Integrity Leading with honesty, responsibility, and strong character.
- Orange Colony of Vision Dreaming big, setting goals, and inspiring others to see what's possible.
- Green Colony of Harmony Building unity, peace, and teamwork in everything they do.
- Red Colony of Empowerment Encouraging themselves and others to be confident, capable, and take action.

Every month, the colonies participate in a variety of fun challenges that include

attendance, school spirit, and other initiatives designed to strengthen both academic and social skills. The colony that rises to the top earns the honor of having its flag raised high, reminding everyone that leadership isn't just something you talk about—it's something you live out. But the vision doesn't stop with our students. Imagine if the principles of Leader in Me spread beyond the classroom walls into the wider community. What if families, businesses, and neighbors embraced these same values of integrity, vision, harmony, and empowerment? Together, we could create not just a Leader in Me school, but a Leader in Me community. The flag outside our school may change from month to month, but the message remains the same: EVERYONE is a leader, EVERYONE has purpose, and together, our hive is stronger.



SEPTIC SYSTEMS, WATER QUALITY, **AND YOU**

Are you among the 25% of Athens-Clarke County residents with a septic system at home? If so, how often do you think about your tank and its maintenance? For your family's health, and the health of the environment, there are a few things you should know when it comes to properly caring for your septic system.

First, it is absolutely crucial to know your system, which includes a drain field and an underground tank. Septic tank sizes vary, and the first step towards proper maintenance is being aware of how many gallons your tank holds. It is also important to know where your system is located so that you do not drive, install plants, add new construction, or direct downspouts over your septic system. Finally, you should know how old your septic system is - according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the average life of a septic system is 20 years. Continuing to use an out-of-date septic system could have catastrophically messy results and require expensive repairs!

Another way to protect your septic system is to use water wisely when at home. Under no circumstances should you overload the system - using more water than the soil can absorb leads to system failure. The best way to avoid this problem is by conserving water: fix leaks and drips, replace old fixtures with newer "low flow" types, and be aware of With all of that said, how do you know if your personal water use. Reducing the flow

during rain events, as saturation of the drain field reduces its absorption rate.

Have you heard of the "3 Ps of Flushing"? This refers to the only four things that should ever go down the toilet: pee, poop, and (toilet) paper. Septic systems treat human waste and wastewater from showers, sinks, dishwashers, etc., so don't use your toilet or sink like a trash can! The use of garbage disposals is not recommended, as they can double the amount of solids in wastewater. It is also important to note that additives and enzymes do not prevent the need for recommended maintenance and pumping schedules.

Speaking of pumping schedules, regular and preventative maintenance of your septic system is key. The EPA recommends that septic systems be inspected and pumped every three to five years - many people find it helpful to keep their maintenance on schedule with the presidential election cycle! Allowing your septic system to fail should never be an option, so do not wait for this to happen before having it pumped. By then, it is usually too late, and repairs are more costly. To avoid further issues, make sure to hire only certified professionals to inspect, pump, and repair your septic system. HOW DO I KNOW IF MY SEPTIC TANK IS **FAILING?**

During system failure, toilets may run slowly or back up, causing raw sewage to flood into your home and impact the health of you and your family.

On a larger scale, septic tank failure also has environmental implications. Septic systems that are poorly designed, installed, and maintained can cause serious problems when it comes to the quality of our local waterways. The most serious cases of septic failure can result in contamination of surface water and groundwater with disease-causing pathogens, such as fecal coliform (or E. coli), and nitrates, both of which are harmful to humans and wildlife alike. Other issues include excessive nitrogen discharge and phosphorus pollution, leading to harmful algal blooms (HABs) and lowered dissolved oxygen levels. HABs often result in the closure of recreational areas and have been known to harm pets.

(excluding individuals on well water) is sourced from our local waterways; therefore, it is absolutely crucial to do our part in protecting their quality – for all of our sake!

As a homeowner on septic, it is your responsibility to properly manage your wastewater. Regular maintenance can prevent backups into your home, costly repairs, and harm to your family and the environment.
