Main Street Drainage Project

Our first of 3 big projects funded by the Athens Clarke County SPLOST is under way. We have assembled a team and set the timeline. This project will address severe flooding issues we have dealt with for decades along Main Street from Five Points to Robert Hardeman Road. The project will cause some inconvenience to citizens and passers through, but the outcome will be worth it. New piping, curbing, and gutters will move more water off the streets and provide relief for citizens who live along the collection areas. Travel will also be safer during heavy rains. The estimated cost is \$2.8 million, and we hope to have the project completed by Summer/Fall of 2024.

Millage Rate/Budget

It is that time of year when we adopt a millage rate and create the budget for 2024. Public Hearings have been set for July 5th at 5:00 p.m. and July 11th at 11:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Please plan to attend if you wish to make comments regarding the City's millage rate.

Comprehensive Plan Update

Thank you to everyone who participated in and worked on the Comprehensive Plan Update for the City of Winterville. City Council voted to adopt the plan, and it is even more user friendly than the original 2018 plan. Please see the city's website for your updated city plan.

Community Center/Upstairs Renovation

The renovation to the upstairs of the Community Center is moving quickly and looking spectacular. The city was awarded a \$75,000 grant from the Georgia Council for the Arts to install an elevator so that we can begin using that part of the Center as an art gallery, art space, meeting space, and possible rental. The Winterville Arts Council will operate the museum hosting what we hope will be regional, national, and international art. The long-awaited Heritage Museum will also have space upstairs to retain and display the history, charm, and character of our City. We hope to have these new exciting amenities open by January 2024.

Five Points Garage Renovation and Development

The Red Brick garage is about to be renovated as part of a mixed-use development that was approved by City Council in June. Look forward to a few more commercial spaces and residential opportunities in our Commercial District by Spring 2024. See the renderings below.



Blacksmith Shop

The City is pursuing a large grant from the Department of Community Affairs with help from our partners at the Northeast Georgia Regional Commission. We could receive up to \$750,000 to renovate the Blacksmith Shop. There is no match required from the city for this grant, but we have agreed to fund the

architectural design as a show of good faith and partnership. This grant would enable the city to save this old historic building and repurpose it for community use. Stay tuned and keep a good thought.

ELECTION NEWS

PURSUANT TO O.C.G.A. 21-2-132(d)(4)(B), A General Municipal Election will be held by the Athens-Clarke County Board of Elections on Tuesday, November 7, 2023, for the purpose of electing the Mayor and two (2) Council Members for the City of Winterville.

A Special Election will be held in conjunction with the General Election.

Qualifying for these seats will open on Monday, August 21, 2023, at 8:30 a.m. and will continue daily from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. with the qualifying period ending on Wednesday, August 23, 2023, at 5:00 p.m. Qualifying will be conducted at the Athens-Clarke County Board of Elections Office, 155 East Washington Street, Athens, Georgia. The qualifying fee is required upon qualifying and is prescribed by law.

The Mayor and two (2) Council seats will be elected for a four-year term that will begin on January 1, 2024. A runoff, if necessary, will be held on Tuesday, December 5, 2023. The polling place shall be the Winterville Train Depot and will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. on Election Day. The Special Election office will be elected to fill one (1) Council Seat vacated by Timothy Pierce-Tomlin for his unexpired term through December 31, 2025.

To vote in this election, anyone who is not currently a qualified voter must register no later than Tuesday, October 10, 2023, at any of the approved voter registration sites. Delivering on the Promise of Restorative Justice

Restorative Justice Diversion (RJD) is an evidence-based, victim-centered model focused on rehabilitating offenders through reconciliation with victims and the affected community. In the RJD model, the offender is held accountable for their actions to reconcile and repair harm and prevent future crime. Rather than being punitive, RJD focuses on repairing relationships and second-chance opportunities for young offenders.

Our office is delighted to share some news regarding our efforts toward establishing restorative justice diversion programming for juvenile offenders. In December 2022, we partnered with the Georgia Conflict Center (GCC) to implement an RJD referral program for youth charged with certain crimes. The partnership recently expanded to include Juvenile Offender Advocate (JOA), an advocate for juvenile offenders whose aim is to lower recidivism by holding all parties accountable while nurturing positive relationships through community collaboration. Juvenile offenders must be 16 and under and willing to participate in the program. If they choose to participate, the offender is referred to GCC and assigned a case manager and a trained facilitator to oversee the conferencing. Both the offender and the victim must agree to participate in the program. If either declines, the case will be returned to the traditional court system. RJD's voluntary and collaborative format helps people harmed by crime feel heard, supported, and empowered. Offenders, in contrast, come to understand the consequences of their actions, and they are given a second chance to right a wrong to the greatest extent possible. To date, we have referred five RJD cases to GCC: one has been completed, two are in the conferencing process, one was declined, and a fifth is pending. We are working with GCC to obtain additional funding to expand the RJD program.

Our office is committed to advancing equity and fairness in the justice system. We are excited to collaborate with leaders and innovators like GCC and JOA, who are contributing to the safety of our community and providing alternatives for our youth.

Winterville's New Bicycle Patrol Officer

Officer Kristy Dassow-Reid is our new Winterville bicycle patrol officer. "My passion as a police officer is working closely with the community to help citizens understand what we do as a department. I hope, in the future, I can offer classes to the community on how to stay safe on the trails, at home, and in the car," said Officer Dassow-Reid.

Dassow-Reid began her career with Athens-Clarke County in 2009. While there, she served



in various roles: working in the jail, on patrol, as a field training officer, and as a detective assigned to sexual assault and domestic violence cases. She also volunteered to be one of the first bicycle patrol officers in Athens and attended specialized training at the Police Academy. Currently, Dassow-Reid is pursuing a master's degree in criminal justice so that she can teach as an adjunct instructor and train officers on the job.

According to Chief Painter, Officer Dassow-Reid works 20 hours per week, mostly on the weekends, but her shifts can vary. Her primary responsibility is to keep Winterville citizens and visitors safe while out and about in the City. You will see Officer Dassow-Reid cycling on the Firefly Trail, in Pittard Park, and regularly in Winterville neighborhoods. While Officer Dassow-Reid rides a bicycle for much of her shift, she may also be out walking the city, and she also has an assigned patrol car.

Chief Painter commented that he is delighted to have Officer Dassow-Reid patrolling in Winterville; they worked together on the police force in Athens, and he is confident that her presence in Winterville has already made a great difference to the citizens here, who are generally excited to see her.

On a related note, Chief Painter recently hired another part-time officer, Officer Bill Charles, a veteran officer of over 32 years with the Atlanta Police Department.

Hello, Garden Enthusiasts!

We are thrilled to share some exciting updates from our beloved community garden! Over the past few months, our garden has been flourishing, thanks to the collective effort and dedication of our green thumbed community members.

Spring Cleaning and Seed/Seedling Planting

It was a slow start this year with the prolonged cold and mild spring season. As we've pulled the last of the carrots and radishes, we quickly replaced them with tomatoes, peppers, squash, cucumbers, and many other spring and summer favorites. We've been doing maintenance on the boxes, weeding, and a general cleanup of the pollinator garden. What a joy to watch as the gardeners' seedlings start to flourish, and their green dreams come to fruition.

Garden Pest Patrol

Along with the growing season, unfortunately comes garden pest season as well. We've been busy patrolling for leaf footed bugs, squash bugs, and vine borers' eggs, as well as the pests themselves. If left unattended, they can wreak havoc on the entire garden. It's a daily commitment, and it takes a village, so if you see us running around with duct tape, we aren't taping up the plants, we're removing egg clusters. Duct tape is surprisingly effective! Feel free to stop by during a workday, which is the last Saturday of each month, and talk to the gardeners if you'd like some information on identifying these pests and organic remedies. We are happy to share.

Helping Those In Need

There's nothing quite as rewarding as reaping the fruits of our labor, except **sharing** the fruits of our labor. We have 4 boxes that some of our gardeners have adopted to grow fresh vegetables for the foodbank. We also collect excess produce each week and take it to the foodbank on Tuesdays. Please feel free to drop off any excess produce or food into the collection box labeled "food bank" under the white canopy next to the tool shed beside the garden. Monday is best to make sure it doesn't sit for long.

Sustainability

At our community garden, we value sustainability and environmental stewardship. We utilize organic fertilizers and organic pest control methods instead of synthetic pesticides and herbicides, which can have harmful effects on human health and the environment. Sure, it's more work, but we think it's worth it.

New Marketing Coordinator

Let me introduce myself: I am Tyler Stansky, the new marketing coordinator here at the Marigold Collective. You know us primarily for our Marigold Market held every Saturday from April to December in Pittard Park. However, we are quite a lot more than that.

We Are Working To Address Food Insecurity In Our Community.

Summer is a time when food insecure families struggle the hardest. Without school lunches and breakfasts, a lot of families within our community go without. The Marigold Collective started our FoodHub in 2022 not only to help our famers, but to get fresh produce into the hands of the food insecure within the Winterville community. It takes a whole community to make this happen and to help the food insecure. Our Saturday Market helps our farmers and members of our community by connecting the food insecure who are eligible for SNAP/EBT benefits with farmers in the community who accept SNAP/EBT. We also participate in a program with Wholesome Wave to double SNAP/EBT benefits for fresh fruits and vegetables. The produce that goes unsold at the Saturday Market is then purchased by the Marigold Collective with money from our Farmer Subsidy.

Monday Market

This produce is then available for the community to purchase at our Monday Market in the old Bank Building at the corner of Church St. and Parkview every Monday from 11:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m. All proceeds made at our Monday Markets go right back into providing food to the community. Every week, we take FoodHub purchased produce, fresh eggs, meat, and other food goods to the food insecure within the Winterville Community. We would not be able to do this without the continued support of our Market Patrons, the City of Winterville, the farmers who work with us, the volunteers who make these markets functional, and donations from our community.

Our goal by the end of 2023 is to be able to match the grant we have for our Farm Subsidy dollar for dollar. This means we would need monthly donations of about \$2,000 to provide food for about 60 families monthly. Our goal is to double this capacity at the beginning of 2024.

Other Community Resources

The Marigold Collective is also constantly working on adding more resources for the community. We have a Commissary Kitchen available for rentals by small businesses who need a place to make their goods. The money raised through these rentals goes back into the

community and making sure that we can get more fresh foods in the hands of more people.

Our Summer Markets are having their best season yet. We have Family Events planned, great kids' activities every week, amazing vendors and farmers. You do not want to miss a single Saturday this season! Be sure to check out our Monday Market for fresh produce and tasty treats. Our Monday Market is also hosting a Blood Drive at the Depot Building on July 31. Please come out and Donate! Follow us on social media to connect with us on more great events this summer.

FIREFLY TRAIL

Firefly Trail Update

Summer is here, and that means long days and extra opportunities for getting out on the Firefly Trail. But there's been no shortage of activity this spring! The 11th annual Ticket to Ride cycling event went off without a hitch on March 25th, and the Winterville SAG stop was appreciated by the many riders who stopped by. Thanks to all the local volunteers who made that happen. We lucked out with beautiful conditions without the high winds participants struggled against in 2022.

April 20th was a long-anticipated and momentous day, as it marked the ribbon cutting celebration of the 525-foot-long Firefly Trail Bridge over Trail Creek. Located in Athens' Dudley Park, the dramatic new bridge combines modern design elements with a timbered central section that hearkens back to the historic railroad trestle originally constructed in the 1880s. Anyone who hasn't yet walked across the wonderful new bridge should do so ASAP!

Down in Greene County, construction of a 5.8mile Firefly Trail segment is moving toward mid-summer completion. The work is being funded through a Georgia Outdoor Stewardship Grant combined with matching funds from Greene County, Union Point, and Woodville, plus sizeable donations from Firefly Trail, Inc., and Atlanta's PATH Foundation.

By the end of this year, the Athens-Clarke County SPLOST Office anticipates bidding out the final 3.3-mile segment that will bring the Firefly Trail into Winterville. Construction is expected to begin in early 2024 with completion targeted for late that year or early 2025.

And finally, the Northeast Georgia Regional Commission has completed conceptual alignment studies for the Firefly Trail through Oglethorpe County, Arnoldsville, and Crawford. Funding opportunities through the Georgia Department of Natural Resources open this fall, and hopes are high that at least one grant application will be submitted. More on this in the next *Gazette*!

Art and Poetry Exhibits

Amy Jackson paints with acrylics. Her small business is Ajacks Art, Capturing the World Through Painting. Patrons will enjoy colorful paintings with subjects that range from a ship at sea to cats and an adorable chipmunk. Summer Reading Program

The Summer Reading Program at Winterville Library kicked off during the 2023 Winterville Marigold Festival. Onstage at the Front Porch, Miss Sam, our children's specialist, read stories, sang songs, and passed out free egg shakers to a large, enthusiastic crowd. Meanwhile, at the library, staff signed up over 40 patrons of all ages—this year we have prize levels for children, teens, and adults.

The Summer Reading Program encourages our patrons and their children to keep up their

reading skills. For teens, a Summer Reading Punch Card is punched for every book checked out. When all the holes have been punched, readers can select a small prize. However, the punch card also serves as an entry in a raffle for a big prize at the end of the summer! For adults, a Summer Reading Bingo Card can be filled out to enter a raffle for a prize basket at the end of the summer! Examples of the Bingo squares include: Check out a cookbook and make one of the recipes, Watch a movie adaptation of a book you've read, and Check out a book written by a Georgia Author.

Marigold Festival and Spring Themed Art Exhibit


